Study a unique degree within our world-class facilities

When you study at Murdoch, you'll have access to a wide range of unique courses, flexible learning options and real-world facilities.

Animal Hospital

The Animal Hospital is a fully functioning surgery and vet facility. It has a working farm, 24-hour pet emergency centre and an equine centre, complete with an operating theatre specifically designed for horses.

Chiropractic Clinic

This practising clinic includes a rehabilitation centre, 11 consulting rooms, a physiological therapeutics facility and a digital radiographic suite. Our Chiropractic students spend a lot of time here, getting to practice their skills on real patients in their final year.

Engineering pilot plant

Our nationally renowned engineering pilot plant is an engineer's playground. The plant includes advanced control systems using a modern industrial data acquisition and control platform.

Exercise Science labs

Gain valuable hands-on experience in our dedicated exercise physiology laboratory, rehabilitation, strength and conditioning laboratory and performance laboratory, used for biomechanics and motor control research and teaching.

Information Technology labs

IT students will develop their skills in our brand new state-of-the-art teaching laboratories. A new games lab equipped with the latest virtual reality equipment will encourage students to get creative and collaborate. Students studying networking or security related courses will have access to a data centre to prototype, experiment and get hands-on with the latest industrial technologies.

Law Moot Court

In our electronic Moot Court, students can try cases in a court room environment and compete with other law schools around the world, thanks to the latest video satellite technology.

Media Arts Centre

The Media Arts Centre houses industry-standard facilities such as a digital TV studio, sound stage, control room, audio studio, four radio studios, as well as a number of editing suites.

Nexus Theatre

This theatre space provides Arts students with a modern and professional area to hone their craft in performance or production.

Nursing simulation suites



Both our Mandurah and Perth campuses house state-of-the-art nursing facilities, where you will learn how to provide care in fully-equipped nursing wards, treatment areas and simulation rooms. Students hone their skills on lifelike, high-tech mannequins with heart, lung and digestive sounds, and other realistic capabilities.

Renewable energy facilities

Our renewable energy facilities include an outdoor test area, photovoltaic research equipment such as a solar simulator and rooftop photovoltaic arrays, and a renewable energy engineering laboratory which houses a comprehensive range of wind energy industry-standard software.

Sporting facility

Our Perth campus will soon benefit from an additional \$5.2 million sporting facility that includes two synthetic football (soccer) pitches (including a cricket oval for summer cricket), new changing rooms, a synthetic cricket pitch, floodlights and spectator seating.



Admission criteria

Applicants with higher education study

Have you previously commenced or completed studied at a higher education provider? For many of our courses, if you have completed two units of university study you can use those to apply to study at Murdoch. Some of our courses have slightly different requirements for applicants with higher education study. You can check the available entry pathways for the course you are interested in by searching for the course at:

You might even be able to get credits or exemptions towards your new degree, reducing the time it takes to graduate. Some courses may have a time limit on when the previous studies were completed due to professional registration requirements.

Credits and exemptions

If you have previous study or professional experience relating to your field of study, you may be eligible to receive a credit or exemption for certain units in your course. Getting a credit or an exemption for your previous study or industry experience is known as advanced standing. If you're eligible for advanced standing for certain units in your course, this could reduce your overall study load and the amount of time you need to study before you can graduate.

Applicants with vocational education and training (VET) study

Have you completed a vocational education and training course? For many of our courses, if you have a Certificate IV or higher VET qualification and can demonstrate English competency, you are eligible to apply for admission. This excludes direct entry into Law, Engineering and Veterinary Science. You can check the available entry pathways for the course you are interested in by searching for the course at:

If you have a Diploma or higher you might even be able to get credits or exemptions towards your new degree, reducing the time it takes to graduate. Some courses may have a time limit on when the previous studies were completed due to professional registration requirements.

Applicants with recent secondary education (within the past two years)

Australian Year 12 students

Have you completed secondary education within the past two years? The following information will help you choose the most suitable pathway for admission.

ATAR/Selection rank

With the exception of Nursing and Veterinary Science, courses at Murdoch have an entry pathway based on a minimum ATAR or Selection Rank required to be considered for admission. This value is available on [course web pages](#) and the [TISC website](#).

Your Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) represents your rank among all Year 12 students in Western Australia as calculated by Tertiary Institutions Service Centre (TISC). ATAR is based on your Tertiary Entrance Aggregate (TEA) and some other factors also detailed on the [TISC website](#).

Your Selection Rank is the actual ranking that is used to assess admission to a course. Your selection rank can include your ATAR and any ATAR-related adjustments such as Murdoch ATAR RISE that you are eligible for.

If you're unsure whether you have an ATAR, are eligible for Murdoch ATAR RISE, or just want to have a chat about your situation before you apply, you can always contact one of our student support staff.

ATAR-related adjustments

Some applicants may be eligible for Murdoch ATAR RISE adjustment factors which can help you get into your preferred course by increasing your Murdoch selection rank.

Murdoch ATAR RISE

Murdoch RISE is intended to provide an adjustment factor to increase the Murdoch University Selection Rank for eligible students to support access to university for students from Regional, Indigenous and low Socio-Economic backgrounds.

If you achieved an ATAR of 60.00 or greater a Murdoch RISE adjustment factor of up to 10.00 points may help you get into your preferred course. There's no application or need to register. If you are eligible, the adjustment factor is automatically added to your raw ATAR score when you apply through TISC or directly to Murdoch. Find out more about ATAR RISE at:

International Baccalaureate

You might have completed an International Baccalaureate which can be converted to an ATAR equivalent using the guidelines provided each year by TISC. [Course webpages](#) show the International Baccalaureate score you will require to be considered for admission.

Other admission options for school leavers

Pre-Law

Although completion of this course will not attract a Murdoch University testamur, students who complete the course at a Credit level (60% or above) will be offered direct entry into the Bachelor of Laws (LLB).

Creative Portfolios

Extenuating circumstances

We understand that the intended pathway to university studies doesn't always go to plan. For this reason, Murdoch University will consider applications from prospective students whose education has been compromised due to genuine hardship, resulting in them falling short of admissions requirements for an undergraduate course. Interstate Year 12

Students who have completed secondary education outside of Western Australia are subject to meeting the same entry requirements as Western Australian students. ATARs are equivalent from every state except Queensland, so an ATAR of 75 in New South Wales will still be 75 in Western Australia. Students from Queensland receive an Overall Position (OP) which is converted into an ATAR equivalent by the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority.

Applicants with work and life experience

Have you completed secondary education more than two years ago or have not completed secondary education or higher studies? Murdoch has a number of admission pathways available with different requirements for you to consider. These are:

- ATAR or Selection Rank
- Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT)
- Mature Age Pathway

ATAR or Selection Rank pathway for applicants who finished secondary education more than two years ago

Even if it's been a while since you finished Year 12, your exam results are valid indefinitely. Scores obtained since 1992 can be converted to an ATAR using the [TISC ATAR calculator](#).

You might also be eligible for ATAR adjustment factors such as [Murdoch ATAR RISE](#) which can increase your Murdoch Selection Rank. Your Selection rank can then be used to apply for admission using the ATAR or Selection Rank pathway.

If you're unsure whether you have an ATAR, are eligible for Murdoch ATAR RISE, or just want to have a chat about your situation before you apply, you can always contact one of our student support staff.

Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT) Test

If you're at least 20 years old and don't have any qualifications or didn't finish high school, you can apply for entry to Murdoch by sitting the Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT). Here's what you need to know about the STAT:

- The STAT is a nationally-recognised test which assesses your abilities for learning at university. It focuses on critical thinking and reasoning skills rather than specific knowledge.
- For entry into most of our undergraduate courses, you'll need to achieve a STAT score of at least 140 in the Written English section and 135 in the Multiple Choice section for tests taken after February 2010. If you took the test before February 2010, you need a minimum score of 145 in both the Written English and Multiple Choice sections.
- You can't use the STAT to apply for direct entry to Law or Veterinary Science. Make sure you check the minimum entry requirements for your course before applying.

Mature Age Pathway (MAP)

If you do not have the academic requirements to be admitted to a course but are passionate about a field of study and feel you have relevant work and life experience then the Murdoch MAP is for you. MAP involves interviews and portfolio submission to be assessed as a suitable applicant for admission to a course.

This pathway is not available for Chiropractic Science and Nursing applicants and will not be available to those who apply within 2 weeks before semester commencement.

Free 14-week, on-campus enabling program and alternative entry pathway.

OnTrack Sprint

Free 4-week, on-campus enabling program and alternative entry pathway. You are eligible for entry to OnTrack Sprint if you have completed your WACE in the last 18 months, generated an ATAR between 60.00-69.95 (or an ATAR of 55.00-59.95 if you are from a school eligible for ATAR RISE) and have demonstrated English competency.




Additional Information

Other Admission Criteria that may apply

Limited Places

Nursing and Veterinary courses have limited places available and have a competitive admissions process that sees school leavers with high ATAR scores considered for admission against applicants that can have a variety of backgrounds including prior tertiary education. School leavers are not required to submit anything additional but due to the limited number of places available there is no Guaranteed Entry ATAR for these courses. Places in these programs are allocated in order of applicants' assessed ranking until the program's quota is filled.

Inherent Requirements

A number of courses have inherent requirements that need to be met in order to be offered a place or to successfully complete the program of study. Course specific inherent requirements are detailed in the course admission information documents available on course web pages.

Clearances

A number of courses have clearance requirements (e.g. working with children) that need to be met in order to be offered a place or to successfully complete the program of study. Course specific clearance requirements are detailed in the course admission information documents available on course web pages.

Access to specific nominated software

A number of courses have a requirement to access specific nominated software that need to be met in order to successfully complete the program of study. Course specific software access requirements are detailed in the course admission information documents available on course web pages.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

Kulbardi Aboriginal Centre

The Kulbardi Aboriginal Centre provides alternative entry pathways to Indigenous people who haven't received an ATAR or completed Year 12. The following courses are available:

- 14-week Indigenous bridging program (K-Track) - The K-Track enabling program can help you develop the skills you need to succeed at university

Domestic applicants with overseas qualifications

Overseas qualifications can be accepted for entry into Murdoch courses. To find out which qualification is recognised and the required level for entry, you can refer to the [course webpages](#), in the section 'Academic Entry Requirements'.

English language proficiency

University study involves building your communication skills including giving verbal presentations and a lot of written assignments and assessments. All our undergraduate courses have an English proficiency requirement. The Bachelor of Law, Bachelor of Nursing, Bachelor of Veterinary Science and Bachelor of Education have higher minimum English entry requirements that are detailed in their course specific admission information.

Common ways you can demonstrate your level of proficiency

- English proficiency tests (STAT, IELTS, TOEFL, OET, PTE, CAE)
- Secondary education (WA) a scaled mark of 50 or higher in ATAR English, Literature or English as an Additional Language or Dialect (EALD)
- University preparation courses (foundation/enabling courses)
- English language courses (academic)
- Previous study at tertiary level (English as the medium of instruction)

Other than English competency we have no prerequisite subjects for any of our degrees, however we do have recommended subjects. If you haven't undertaken and passed the recommended subjects then we'll provide the preparatory units during your first year to make sure you are set up for your chosen degree. How to apply

Apply through TISC

Unless you were studying on a student visa, if you recently finished secondary education and want to apply to start at Murdoch in Semester 1 2018 you'll need to apply through the Tertiary Institutions Service Centre.

Applications to the Tertiary Institutions Service Centre (TISC) are open between 7 August 2017 and 4 January 2018. It pays to be organised as late fees apply for applications submitted after 29 September 2017.

Here's what you need to do to complete your TISC application:

- If you've been automatically registered with the TISC website, you can log in using your WACE Candidate Number or TISC Number. If you don't already have a login, you can register online.
- Choose your six course preferences. Getting the order of your preferences right will give you the best chance of getting into the course you really want.
- Complete your application form, making sure to pay any fees.
- Print off your application coversheet and submit all the supporting documents listed.
- Check your inbox. Once you have applied and your application fee has been processed, TISC will send you an email confirmation.

Apply directly to Murdoch University

For other applicants including recent school leavers who are applying for Semester 1 outside of the TISC application period or plan to start university in Semester 2, you can apply directly to Murdoch online.

Online applications for most courses at Murdoch close on the Friday before Orientation Week.

Here's how you can apply:

- Go to MyAdmission and create a new Applicant ID, or log in with an existing ID and password.
- Your application will take just 20 minutes to complete - it is saved as you go, so you can come back later to finish it.
- Complete your application online using the name and code of the course you're applying for, which can be found using the course finder.
- Upload your academic transcript and any other supporting documentation (Word or PDF documents preferred).
- You can check the status of your application by simply logging back into MyAdmissions.
- Ask us a question: Send us a message via our online form and we'll get back to you within 48 hrs.

We can accept scanned copies of your documents but not e-transcripts. If you don't have the documents available when you submit your application, you can upload them at a later date by logging back into MyAdmission. Once you have applied, you can track the status of your application through MyAdmission. Upon submitting your application online, generally you would expect to hear from us within 3 working days.

Accepting or deferring an offer

Getting an offer is an exciting step in your journey to undergraduate study at Murdoch. Secure your place by accepting your offer. Here's what you need to know about receiving and accepting an offer:

- Whether you applied through TISC or directly to Murdoch, you'll receive your offer by email, so keep an eye on your inbox.
- When you receive an offer, you need to respond to it by the deadline noted in the email or apply for an extension. For any questions about TISC offers, check out the TISC website. How you respond will depend on whether you are a domestic or international student, or have applied to Murdoch through one of our packaged partners.
- If you don't receive an offer, don't panic. Remember, there's more than one way to get into Murdoch. We're here to help, so speak to us about your situation and we'll help you explore your options.

To respond to your Murdoch offer, you need to:

- Activate your student account by using your Murdoch student number, which you'll find in your offer letter, to log into MyMurdoch. You can also set up your student password and confirm your email address and mobile number.
- Accept your offer to secure your place at Murdoch. You can also defer it to start another semester or reject it if you no longer wish to study at Murdoch.
- If you are accepting you can then start enrolling in units to lock in your timetable for the semester.
- Remember, if you've changed your mind about what you want to study at Murdoch, you may be able to transfer to a different course after you start. Contact our Student Centre to discuss your options.

Fees and Charges

At Murdoch, you pay for the individual units you enrol in, rather than an overall course fee. Some units cost more than others. This may be due to the number of credit points the unit awards or the level of resources required to teach it.

The amount that you pay will depend on several factors, including whether you are a domestic or international student, your residency status and the units that you choose. As a domestic student your fees will differ from those of international students, and you'll be eligible for a Commonwealth Supported Place in all undergraduate courses. More fee information at:

You may be eligible for a HECS-HELP loan

In a Commonwealth Supported Place, the government pays part of the cost of your course fees each semester and you pay the rest. The part you pay is known as your student contribution. Australian citizens, eligible New Zealand citizens and holders of permanent humanitarian visas can pay their student contribution either:

- upfront directly to the university
- by deferring payment to a HECS-HELP loan.

A HELP loan allows you to defer the payment of your student contribution until your income reaches a certain level. When you're earning enough money to start repaying your loan, it is repaid through the tax system as a percentage of your salary. Other Fees

As well as your course fees, there are other fees and costs to consider when planning the financial aspects of your studies. These include fees for administrative and other services, and costs specific to your course, such as for equipment and textbooks.

Student Services and Amenities Fee

The Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) is a fee charged by all higher education providers, including Murdoch, to help with student services and features that aren't directly linked to your studies at Murdoch. We use these fees to help provide you with:

- health and counselling services
- careers and employment advice
- sport and recreation facilities and services

The SSAF is charged twice a year, and the amount you pay depends on whether you're a full or part-time student, and which campus you study at. The current SSAF fees are available [here](#).

Parking Fees

Parking at Murdoch is easy, but you will need to budget for parking fees if you're planning to drive to uni. Car parks on campus are zoned and colour coded either red or green.

Red zone parking is closer to the main buildings. An annual permit is \$480.00.

Green zone parking is situated slightly further away. An annual permit is \$200.00

Visitors' ticket parking is also available if you'll only be driving to Murdoch occasionally.

Course-related expenses

Your tuition fees cover the cost of your education, but you also need to pay for textbooks or any other materials and equipment that may be required for your course. Depending on your area of study, you may also need to pay for:

- textbooks
- field trips
- laboratory equipment such as lab coats and safety goggles
- printing and photocopying
- Working with Children Checks

If you are studying externally, you might need to attend mandatory on-campus sessions for some units, so you'll want to factor in the cost of travelling to Murdoch and accommodation if necessary.
