A desk audit of volunteering in universities around Australia, literature review, and interviews with key stakeholders have revealed interesting insights about why students volunteer, what they hope to achieve from doing so, what assists the volunteering process and what needs further attention.

The workshop will share some of the stories and participants will be introduced to the *Good Practice Guides* being developed for students, hosts, employers and university management. The workshop is designed for staff designing and delivering student volunteer programs, host organisations and students.
